Topic Sentence – States the main idea / an answer to the prompt [You might wish to clarify the topic sentence in another sentence, but it is not obligatory]

Evidence 1 – example which supports the topic sentence

Analysis of Evidence 1 – explains the evidence and clarifies how it supports the topic sentence

Evidence 2 – another example which supports the topic sentence **Analysis of Evidence 2** - explains the evidence and clarifies how it supports the topic sentence

Evidence 3 – another example which supports the topic sentence **Analysis of Evidence 3** - explains the evidence and clarifies how it supports the topic sentence

Concluding sentence – summarises the previous information in an original way
